#5: Dupont circle

#4: Foggy bottom

When you're tired of sightseeing near the mall, stroll over to Foggy Bottom and grab yourself a bite and drink. This unique college neighborhood features an eclectic restaurant and bar scene with an even more unique mix of diplomats, lobbyists, and college students frequenting these establishments. It's a melting pot of the almighty powerful, clueless college students, and people who work in the service industry. How do you not visit?

Make sure you grab a cocktail at Top of the Gate, where on each side of this rooftop bar you'll be able to take in the Watergate Hotel, Washington Monument, and beautiful Potomac River, all adjacent to this famous viewing point. You should also experience the Rasika West End if you love delicious Indian cuisine.




#3: Bloomingdale

This tiny 12-block neighborhood hosts both worlds: old-timey, colorful brick and stone apartments on the northside, and a collection of local hangouts in the southern portion. Right smack in-between is the secluded one-acre Crispus Attucks Park. This neighborhood gives you a little bit of everything while effectively isolating you from the busy goings on of the rest of D.C.

#7: Georgetown

Known for its narrow-cobbled stone streets that will eerily remind you of 18th-century Western European cities, Georgetown is one of the more unforgettable neighborhoods in the country. It's not cheap, but if you can afford to drop some cash, eat at one of the known upmarket restaurants, like 1789. There's also a fantastic jogging route you can run next to the C&O Canal and the infamously delicious Georgetown Cupcake bakery where you can gorge after burning all those calories.

If you're a major cinephile, you can capture some haunting photos at the infamous Exorcist Steps. Just be wary of human-possessing demons who are known for ruining vacations and trips to the area.



#1: U STREET CORRIDOR

Known as the heart of the LGTBTQ community, the U Street Corridor is by far and away the most happening social scene in D.C. When you're looking to catch the game, head down to Nellies, a uniquely gay sports bar that becomes a happening night club scene after the sun sets. There's also Marvin, a soul food joint named after the famous musician Marvin Gaye.

Looking for a music hangout, but not sure what genre you're feeling? Just stroll down U Street and wander into DC9, Tropicalia, or any of the other music halls and bars that are popping through all hours of the night.







Northern Virginia

The Northern Virginia area is a much quieter, family-friendly neighborhood featuring small up-and-coming towns like Del Ray and Old Town Alexandria. With the introduction of Amazon HQ2 to Arlington, all the surrounding areas are seeing a significant increase in both home and rent prices as well as growth in the service and entertainment business. Locals strongly suggest experiencing the town by water taxi, or trollies, as both modes of transportation show off the area's best views of the Potomac, adjacent District of Columbia, and historic architecture.

With the promise and recent construction of Amazon HQ2, home prices have skyrocketed in the Arlington area (17%+ since November). However, neighboring towns have not seen this increase. Experts are uncertain when price increases will happen. They are currently labeling the area a "Very Hot" sellers' market. Expect home and rent prices near the NoVa area to increase, while exorbitantly high D.C. and Maryland home and rent prices to remain stable.
